Still Thinking — An Easter Youth Camp— Christopher Page



When I was a teenager our youth group would organise Easter camps in the Lamington Plateau in Southern Queensland. We alternated between Binna Burra and O'Reily's Guest House. We never stayed in the guesthouse, we always camped in tents.

The programme for the Easter camp followed the familiar structure. The day began with prayer and quiet time

followed by grace and breakfast; then morning Bible study, usually one hour of input and an hour of questions and discussion; an afternoon swim or hike; an evening meal; a campfire with skits, songs and a devotional; then off to bed. Well it may have taken a couple of hours to settle in for the night as teenagers raged freely between the tents!

On Saturday and Sunday the programme was repeated until we would break camp after lunch on Monday. As we drove back to Brisbane and as the mountain experience retreated behind me, I always felt a deep sadness. Year after year the Easter camp was a true mountain top experience that formed and shaped me.

Now some 50 years later I wonder what it was that made that Easter experience so vital and vibrant at the time. The Bible studies were I think, interesting. I really can't remember what we studied. I suspect there was a good dose of "being a true Christian" with more from the Letters of St Paul, than the parables of Jesus. I certainly don't underestimate the buzz of adolescent sexuality. The memory of the secret hand holding on the torchlight night walks. And there was also a strong bond that developed between the youth leaders and the young people at these camps. We saw them in a different light – less formal and more engaging perhaps. But there was something much greater that was touched in those few days together.

The Irish author Josephine Hart said, "There is an eternal landscape, a geography of the soul; we search for its outlines all our lives." It is not unimportant that during these retreats we were surrounded by the most glorious landscape. The Lamington Plateau is magnificent and the dark night sky 80 kilometres from Brisbane was luminous with moon and stars. As we gazed up into that dome of the evening sky it was as if the dark mystery peered back at us and saw deep into our souls. I think what was so magical about those Easter camps was that we had the space to wander within our own thoughts, feelings and desires and to wonder at the remarkable shape of the universe. And even though we were surrounded by friends, leaders and the natural environment the moment was really all about me and who I was.

In his book, Let Your Life Speak, Parker Palmer wrote, "Before I can tell my life what I want to do with it, I must listen to my life telling me who I am." I now know

we needed the silence and grandeur of that place in Southern Queensland to hear the still small voice within us telling us who we were. Now in the "autumn" of my life I can see that it was the God within, the ground of being who was whispering my name in those quivering life giving moments. My life was being opened to a sacred geography of the soul that would shape and reshape me for the rest of my life.
